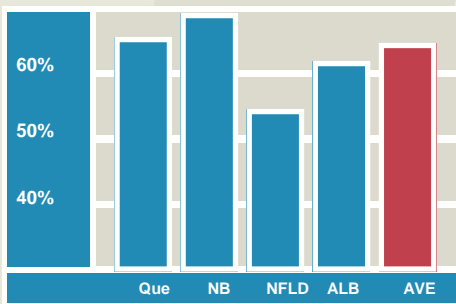


According to Elections Canada the turnout for the 2006 federal election was 64.7%. This means that on average over 120,000 Building Trades families did not vote.

Participation is paramount

What are the risks of not voting?

The risk of not voting is Canadian working families get left behind.

NATIONAL REACH

Your vote in Canada is very valuable. The system we have is much like in hockey, the team with the most pucks in the net wins the game. Elections can be won or lost on your vote and that can have national impact.

The risk of not being involved in the political process means your seat is empty when issues affecting your family and workplace are being discussed.

LOCAL IMPACT

Your Member of Parliament can influence Canada.

If you are not on the voting list on election day you must:
1. Provide one original piece of identification issued by a government or government agency containing your photo, name and address (e.g. **driver's license**). OR...

2. Provide two original pieces of identification authorized by the Chief Electoral Officer of Canada. Both pieces must contain your name, and one must also contain your address (e.g. health card and hydro bill). OR...

3. Swear an oath and be vouched for by a registered elector who is on the list of electors in the same polling division and who has an acceptable piece or pieces of identification (e.g. a neighbour, your roommate).

New voting identification rules!

When you vote, you impact things like the Canada Labour Code, Federal Fair Wage Policy, the Canada Health Act and investment in communities.

When you vote you impact things like environmental policy and collective bargaining rights.

Who is the candidate with your regional interests in mind?

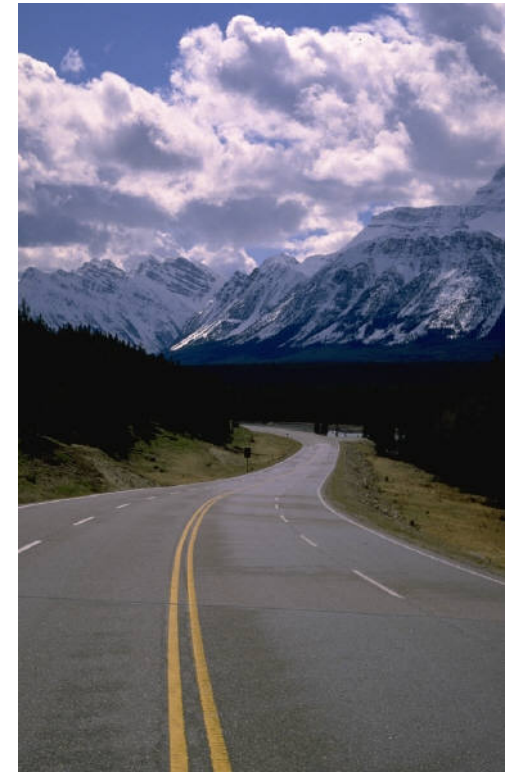
Are there candidates who are better than others?
